Kansas Farmers Union's 2011 annual Convention, "The 2012 Farm Bill: A Defining Moment in Agriculture," will be held December 2-3 at the Ramada in Downtown Topeka. "The 2012 Farm Bill, being worked during a time of extreme budgeting, will reflect what we as a society expect from our producers in regard to agricultural production stability and stewardship of our earth's resources trusted to us," KFU President Donn Teske said.

Over a day and a half, 8 speakers will talk about the local food movement, competitive markets, farm policy and other issues facing rural Kansas.

The convention will start on Friday, Dec. 2 with a free lunch and State Director **Herb Bartel** will share his experiences working on the North Slope of Alaska. The delegate session will then be called to order at 1:30 p.m., when a majority of the policy work will be done.

There are real challenges to re-developing regional food systems, the farmers, communities and

economy of Kansas would benefit by diversifying food production, processing and sales. **Mercedes Taylor-Puckett**, the local foods coordinator for the Kansas Rural Center, will share opportunities to cultivate new relationships across our Kansas food supply chain.

Farmers Union members, agents visits Capitol Hill

Kansas Farmers Union members and insurance agents visited Washington DC and Capitol Hill on Sept. 11-14 for National Farmers Union's Fall Fly-In.

"The men and women we send to represent us have a huge responsibility and you really come to better understand this when participating in an event like the Fly-In. I feel that it was a great experience and am very thankful for having been provided the opportunity to participate," Todd Whitehill said.

Three KFU members (Lavern Potuzak of Agenda, Brenda Coyle of Munden and Nick Levendofsky of Republic), four Farmers Union Insurance agents (Richard Boxum of Downs, Jerry and Enid Cady of Marion, and Todd Whitehill of McPherson)

and two KFU staffers (Lauren Clary of Windom and Donn Teske of Wheaton) attended the event that took them to USDA, the White House, five senators' offices and seven representatives' offices.

"The meetings with the senators and representatives really went great, just wish we could of had more time with some of them. They and their staff seemed real receptive to the farmers views," Potuzak said.

"All the congressmen on our list except Senator Roberts met personally with us and listened to our concerns. I was especially impressed with Senator Moran and his staff, they took time to visit with us and answered our questions," Jerry Cady said. "I appreciated the meeting that NFU arranged with RMA concerning the crop insurance pro-

gram."

"In the current economic and fiscal environment, it was very clear that reducing the various budgets was the major issue at hand and I felt a sense of urgency, in all meeting, to accomplish this goal. While there appeared to be general agree-

ment regarding the implications of some of these cuts, it was not clear to me that anyone was sure what could and couldn't be salvaged," Whitehill said.

Kansas Farmers Union receives grant to help Iraq veterans return to the farm

Lyons, NE - While some veterans returning home have jobs waiting for them, many do not and are returning to rural areas where jobs can be scarce. The USDA Risk Management Agency has awarded the Center for Rural Affairs, Farmer-Veteran Coalition, Kansas Farmers Union, and eight additional partner organizations with funding intended to introduce new veteran farmers and ranchers to various areas of agriculture, and thereby find solutions to the employment and economic challenges facing so many rural veterans.

"The long-term goal for this project is to help new veteran farmers and ranchers successfully establish farms and ranches in Kansas, Nebraska, Colorado and Missouri," said Kathie Starkweather with the Center for Rural Affairs.

According to Starkweather, the project will allow veterans to learn strategies and implement plans for farm/ranch start-up, including financing, land access,

and business development. Veterans will also learn to access the resources available to them for technical assistance, production and marketing information, and mentoring.

The organizations partnering in this project are the Center for Rural Affairs, Farmer-Veteran Coalition, Swords to Plowshares, Kansas Farmers Union, Missouri Farmers Union, Rocky Mountain Farmers Union, Colorado AgrAbility, Kansas AgrAbility Project, Nebraska AgrAbility Project, and Missouri AgrAbility Project.

Rural America's small cities and towns are, however, less prepared to absorb returning veterans than many urban centers. The Iraq and Afghan Veterans of America have noted that veterans returning to rural communities were having the hardest time

reintegrating into civilian life as these communities lacked both viable employment opportunities and access to needed veteran services.

The smallest of farms have increased in the past decade, coincident with the great consumer interest in locally grown, organic and specialty foods. This demand creates unique and exciting opportunities for beginning farmers – and the veterans who would become farmers.

"The participation rate of young rural Americans in the military is and has been far above the national average for at least two decades. When veterans receive training and secure agricultural employment in rural communities, rural America is strengthened, all of America is strengthened," said Starkweather.

According to the grant application, veterans can build on their discipline and sense of service and use farming or ranching to reintegrate into soci-

ety gracefully and fruitfully. They can also repopulate and reenergize rural communities. Some assistance to launch a new generation of veteran farmers and ranchers can help ensure their successful entry into farming and ranching and a successful return to their country.

The Center for Rural Affairs and its partner organizations will hold educational workshops in Nebraska and Kansas to provide information and introduce resources on specialty crops, livestock, land access, financing, crop insurance, production & marketing high value crops, and resources for beginners, veterans and the disabled.

Kansas Farmers Union will hold two educational workshops, two farm tours, assist with financial planning, provide Farmer Veterans Coalition with Kansas resources for the Resource Guide, and promote and recruit contacts in Kansas through the media.

KFU's new by-laws will take affect at Convention

Delegates will vote differently for State Directors

Revised by-laws adopted at last year's convention alter the district boundaries, election process and terms of KFU regional Board members.

- Districts reduced from 6 (six) to 2 (two), creating new North and South districts.
- 3 (three) directors from each district, with terms to be three years (formally 1 year).
- No two district board members can have residence in the same county or Farmers Union local.
- More than one member from a single county can be nomi-

nated, but only one can serve on the Board.

- Terms will be staggered. Only one director from each district will be elected annually.

In order to facilitate the change and institute the initial staggered terms, the vote totals will determine offset in service. The candidate with the highest vote total will serve three years, second highest, two years and third highest, one year. In the event of a tie vote, a coin toss will determine the order of succession. If you have any questions of this process, please contact the state office for details.

During the Fly-In, NFU released a study, titled Farmer-Owned Reserves, conducted by the University of Tennessee's Agricultural Policy Analysis Center. The policy approach includes a combination of farmer-owned reserves, increased loan rates, set-asides, the elimination of direct payments and reduced reliance on other government payment instruments.

"Dr. Ray found that, if we had adopted this approach over the last 13 years (1998-2010), the value of U.S. exports would have been nearly \$5 billion more than it actually was," Roger Johnson, National Farmers Union president, said. "Corn prices would have been \$0.26 higher than they actually were, wheat prices would have been \$0.48 higher, and soybeans would have averaged \$1.09 more over the period studied. The farmer-owned reserve acts to moderate highs and lows of grain prices, and during the period studied, farmers would have gained more income from market receipts and relied less on government payments, which would have been reduced by more than half."

USDA

At the USDA building, over 200 Farmers Union Fly-In participants met with Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack and other top USDA officials.

Vilsack said the House is discussing a 13 percent reduction in USDA's budget and the Senate is looking at cutting USDA's salary budget.

"We have very difficult choices ahead of us," Vilsack said. "It will not be easy and there will be some real challenges."

Vilsack stressed the important job that America's farmers and ranchers have in National Security.

"We've got to educate the country of the significance and importance of family agricul-

ture," Vilsack said. "Once you get that recognition, then you will get support."

Vilsack said he sees USDA programs collapsing, becoming more flexible and a greater emphasis on guarantees, technical assistance and simplicity.

White House

Farmers Union members then met with people from President Obama's staff at the White House Executive Office Building.

Melody Barnes, Director of White House Domestic Policy

Council, said the Rural Council is focusing on opportunity (increasing capital), innovation (expanding technology), renewable energy, quality of life (health care and poverty), and conservation.

Larry Elworth, Agriculture Counselor to EPA Administrator Jackson, said the "key problem is the availability of clean water." He said a huge concern is the balance of energy and agriculture water use.

Ambassador Isi Siddiqui, Chief Agriculture Negotiator for the

US Trade Representative, said they are working on how to level the playing field on international trade and open up markets.

"When members of NFU are given the opportunity to visit the White House and USDA, not only to hear from Administration officials, but to be heard, it is extremely important to our membership. I feel the meetings were very productive and gave those in attendance a firsthand look at the path U.S. agricultural policy is taking," Levendofsky said.
